Christina E. "Tina" Mark, 68, of Bainbridge, passed away on Saturday, January 18, 2025 at Lancaster General Hospital. Born in Columbia, she was the daughter of the late John and Odessa (Hixon) Biesecker. Tina was the wife of Dana Mark with whom she celebrated 47 years of marriage this past December 17th.

Tina was a graduate of Elizabethtown Area High School class of 1976. She previously worked for Lancaster Parks & Recreation as a state naturalist. Tina was a member of Encounter Church in Bainbridge and the Haldeman Mansion Preservation Society. She enjoyed teaching children about Native Americans, nature and spending time at Camp Yolijsa.

Surviving in addition to her husband, Dana, are three children, Anthony Mark of Fleetwood, PA, Alesha Kerr of Rheems, and John Mark of Bainbridge; six grandchildren, Odessa, Sophia, Lauren, Arielle, Kiera, and Josie; and two brothers, John Larry Biesecker, husband of Nancy of Elizabethtown and William Biesecker, husband of Elaine of Lititz.
